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Drawing Closer: A People of Prayer

Last year, we held a unique service in the life of our church. One Sunday morning in November, we planned to devote an entire service to Thanksgiving and Prayer. During this service of prayer and healing, we offered the opportunity for people to come and receive prayer and anointing. Together, we lifted up our hearts to God, giving Him thanks for hearing our prayers and trusting that He would bring healing and hope to those in our congregation and greater community.

I knew it would be a different type of service that would push us out of our comfort zones. I wasn't prepared for the lights to go out! Yet even that was a reminder that God was asking us to do something different, to remember that we didn't need to depend on technology or the familiar; we simply needed to enter His Presence together. Later this month, we'll continue a new tradition that started last year, our service of Prayer and Healing.

At our core, we have been a people of prayer, and this is a great opportunity for us to live out that value. Through a time of intentional prayer for those in need and those in our community, we believe that God will hear and act. He will meet our needs, and we will give Him glory. As we prepare for this service, which will be held on Sunday, November 30, I encourage you to think about the ways God has answered prayers this year, and encourage others who need healing to join us so they can be lifted up in prayer. Pray that God will ready your heart for a different service, and ask Him to act in mighty ways! Most importantly, plan to be here on November 30, and join us in prayer!

Forgotten Key to Biblical Evangelism

Romans 7:9 – "Once I was alive apart from the law; but when the commandment came, sin sprang to life, and I died."

"I was alive without the law once; but when the commandment came, sin revived (Romans 7:9). So, it is with the work-righteous and the proud unbelievers. Because they do not know the Law of God, which is directed against them, it is impossible for them to know their sin. Therefore, also they are not amenable to instruction. *If they would know the Law, they would also know their sin; and sin to which they are now dead would become alive in them.*" – Martin Luther

Have you heard it said, "I'm as good as any Christian!" A Christian, by himself, isn't good. Jesus said that God alone is good. The only "goodness," or righteousness, that the believer has comes from Jesus Christ (2 Cor. 5:21; Phil. 3:9). The Bible tells us that, without Christ, man is corrupt and filthy: "All have turned away, all have become corrupt; there is no one who does good, not even one." (Psalm 14:3)

Can you see that we need the Law before the Gospel can move a person's heart? Today, many pastors in their preaching avoid the use of the Law to placate the "itching ears" of their congregants. Can you see this forgotten key to evangelism allows us to call evil good and good evil! This is what we have done wrong for decades – we have not allowed the Law to speak clearly to our hearts, we then think much more of ourselves then we should!

Charles Spurgeon, called the Prince of Preachers, stated, "I do not believe that any man can preach the Gospel who does not preach the Law." The Law is the needle, and you cannot draw the silken thread of the gospel through a person's heart unless you first send the needle of the Law to make way for it.
